The churning was done using Mount Mandara as a churning rod and the **serpent Vasuki** as the rope. During this cosmic event, many treasures and powerful beings emerged from the ocean, including the **amrita**.

After the churning of the ocean, a pot containing the nectar of immortality (amrita) was created. The gods and demons both desired to obtain this nectar, leading to a fierce struggle. During this battle, four drops of the nectar spilled from the pot, landing at four specific places on Earth: **Prayagraj (Allahabad), Haridwar, Ujjain, and Nashik**. 3. **Sediment and Natural Resources:** The areas around these river confluences are rich in alluvial soil, which is often mineral-laden and fertile. Over centuries, the movement of water through these regions has contributed to the high mineral content of the water, which has been perceived as contributing to its cleansing properties. The sediments in the water could potentially have therapeutic benefits, contributing to its ability to purify the body, although the exact chemical properties would require scientific study to fully understand.

Traditional Healing Beliefs:

Ancient beliefs about the healing powers of these waters are supported by centuries of cultural practices. Many people who visit the Kumbh Mela come with the belief that taking a ritual bath in these rivers can heal illnesses, cure diseases, or purify the soul.
