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SWADESHI MOVEMENT IN INDIA: A HISTORICAL MOVEMENT

Abstract:

This paper examines the administrative strategies employed by the Indian National Congress (INC) during the Swadeshi Movement (1905-1915) and their impact on India's struggle for independence from British colonial rule. The Swadeshi Movement emerged in response to British economic exploitation and the partition of Bengal, advocating for the promotion of indigenous industries and local goods. Through a multifaceted approach, the INC implemented strategies encompassing economic initiatives, educational reforms, cultural activities, and grassroots mobilization.

Key economic initiatives included the establishment of nationalist schools and the promotion of indigenous products through Swadeshi melas, which fostered national pride and unity. Educational strategies aimed to instill a sense of cultural identity and self-reliance among the youth. Grassroots mobilization through local committees facilitated mass participation and awareness, while the involvement of women challenged traditional gender roles and empowered them within the nationalist movement. Despite facing significant challenges from British repression and economic limitations, the INC's cohesive efforts successfully galvanized public support and established a strong foundation for future independence movements. This paper contends that the lessons of the Swadeshi Movement underscore the importance of collective action, cultural identity, and economic self-reliance in contemporary social and political movements. Ultimately, the legacy of the INC's strategies during the Swadeshi Movement continues to influence modern activism in the pursuit of social justice and equality.

The Indian National Congress (INC) emerged as a vital political force in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, playing a pivotal role in India's struggle for independence from British colonial rule. Established in 1885, the INC initially focused on moderate reforms within the colonial framework but evolved significantly throughout its history, especially during the nationalist movements of the 1900s (Bhatia, 2018). The organization provided a platform for Indian leaders to unify and articulate the aspirations of the Indian populace, making it instrumental in the progression of the freedom struggle.



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The Swadeshi Movement, which gained momentum in the early 1900s, was a direct response to the British economic policies that exploited Indian resources and undermined indigenous industries. The movement advocated for the boycott of British goods and the promotion of Indian-made products. Initiated in 1905 following the partition of Bengal, the Swadeshi Movement sought not only to foster economic self-sufficiency but also to ignite nationalist sentiments across the country (Chatterji, 2015). It emphasized the importance of local production, self-reliance, and unity among Indians to resist colonial oppression.

The administrative strategies adopted by the INC during the Swadeshi Movement were critical in organizing protests, mobilizing the masses, and channeling public sentiment towards independence. By establishing regional committees, harnessing the power of the press, and facilitating grassroots campaigns, the INC effectively transformed the Swadeshi Movement into a widespread national movement (Gupta, 2021). Overall, understanding the role of the Indian National Congress and its strategic initiatives during the Swadeshi Movement is essential for comprehending the complexities of India's fight for independence. This study highlights how the INC's organizational capabilities and proactive measures contributed significantly to fostering a sense of national identity and resistance against colonial rule.

2. Historical Context

2.1 British Colonial Policies and Their Impact on India

This campaign was not merely about economic resistance; it became a powerful expression of national identity and pride. The INC capitalized on this sentiment, urging the masses to reject foreign products and embrace Indian enterprises (Kumar & Singh, 2019). The role of educational institutions, cultural organizations, and the press was significant in disseminating these ideas, enabling the INC to mobilize various social groups, including students, women, and workers.

The growing discontent with British rule was also fueled by various socio-economic issues, such as famines, unemployment, and the lack of basic rights, which further entrenched the resolve of Indian nationalists. It is within this context of rising nationalism and economic hardship that the Swadeshi Movement took shape, highlighting the need for organized political action and collective national effort to secure India's independence.

3. Administrative Strategies of the INC

The Indian National Congress (INC) utilized a range of administrative strategies to effectively orchestrate the Swadeshi Movement, thereby transforming it into a powerful nationalist campaign. These strategies included organizational restructuring, grassroots mobilization, media engagement, and collaboration with other social and political groups. Each of these facets contributed significantly to the movement's success and the broader struggle for independence.

3.1 Organization of the INC

One of the key strategies was the reorganization of the INC to enhance its effectiveness in promoting the Swadeshi Movement. 3.4 Collaboration with Other Social Groups

By forming alliances with labor unions, agricultural associations, and cultural organizations, the INC was able to widen its reach and amplify its message (Ghosh & Das, 2022). This collaborative approach fostered solidarity among different sectors of society and reinforced the concept of a united struggle against colonial rule. The involvement of organizations such as the All India Muslim League and the Hindu Mahasabha in specific Swadeshi initiatives underscored the collective nature of the movement (Parikh, 2017).

4. Economic Initiatives

The economic initiatives undertaken by the Indian National Congress (INC) during the Swadeshi Movement were central to its objective of fostering self-reliance and countering the detrimental impact of British economic policies on Indian industries. By encouraging the production and consumption of indigenous goods, the INC aimed to not only revive the Indian economy but also cultivate national pride. 4.2 Establishment of Swadeshi Retail Outlets

To support local products and their manufacturers, the INC encouraged the establishment of Swadeshi retail outlets across the country. These outlets functioned as platforms for selling indigenous goods and provided a direct alternative to British products, effectively implementing the boycott strategy advocated by the movement. Data from various regions indicate a significant increase in the number of Swadeshi retail outlets from 1905 onward.
