National Minorities Development and Finance Corporation (NMDFC): Provides financial assistance to minority entrepreneurs. Skill Development Programs: Vocational training initiatives to enhance employability among minorities.

Social Welfare and Infrastructure Development

Multi-Sectoral Development Programme (MSDP): Focuses on improving infrastructure in minority-dominated districts. Haj Subsidy (Now Withdrawn): Previously provided financial assistance for Muslim pilgrims traveling to Mecca.

Reports such as the Sachar Committee Report (2006) have highlighted the poor socio-economic status of Muslims in India.
