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MARRIAGE TRENDS AND DIVORCE RATES IN URBAN KARNATAKA: A SOCIOLOGICAL STUDY

However, Rapid Urbanization, Industrialization, Women's Education, Economic independence, and Globalization have significantly influenced marital patterns in urban areas. In "Karnataka", especially in cities like Bengaluru, Mysuru, Mangaluru, and Hubballi–Dharwad, noticeable shifts have occurred in marriage practices and divorce trends over the past three decades. This study examines changing patterns of marriage, rising divorce rates, causes of marital breakdown, and the sociological implications of these changes in urban Karnataka. Using secondary data, sociological theories, and qualitative observations, the study explores how modernization, gender roles, economic independence, and cultural transformation are reshaping marital institutions. The findings indicate that while marriage remains socially valued, its meaning and stability are undergoing transformation in urban contexts. The study concludes with policy suggestions and social interventions to strengthen family well-being.

Although national statistics indicate relatively low divorce rates compared to Western contexts, recent evidence points to gradual increases, raising important questions about the social forces underlying these shifts.

This study seeks to explore the patterns of marriage and divorce in urban Karnataka, situating them within broader socio-cultural and economic contexts. By examining quantitative trends alongside lived experiences, the research aims to illuminate the complex factors influencing decisions to marry, remain married, or pursue divorce. Key areas of investigation include the impact of education, employment, gender roles, economic independence, and cultural expectations on marital outcomes. Understanding these dynamics not only contributes to academic debates on family change in India but also offers insights for policymakers, social workers, and community leaders addressing the needs of urban families. Despite these emerging trends, there is limited sociological research examining the relationship between changing marriage patterns and divorce rates in urban Karnataka.

Therefore, the present study seeks to analyze the changing trends in marriage and the factors influencing divorce rates in urban Karnataka. The study aims to understand how social, economic, cultural, and demographic factors shape marital relationships and contribute to marital stability or dissolution in contemporary urban society. Such an inquiry is important for understanding the transformation of family institutions and for formulating policies and interventions that promote healthy family relationships and social well-being.

Factors such as work stress, dual-career families, financial pressures, changing expectations from marriage, reduced influence of extended families, and increased awareness of legal rights have contributed to marital conflicts and dissolution.

- **Uberoi (1993) – Family, Kinship and Marriage in India:** Patricia Uberoi examined the changing patterns of marriage and family in contemporary India. The study highlighted the gradual shift from traditional arranged marriages to marriages based on individual choice, especially in urban areas. The author observed that modernization and education have significantly influenced marital relationships and family structures.

- **M. Shah (1998) – The Family in India: Critical Essays:** A. M. Shah analyzed transformations in Indian family systems due to urbanization and industrialization. The study reported a rise in nuclear families and changing intergenerational relationships, which have affected marital stability and family cohesion.

The findings help explain how urbanization in Karnataka may influence marriage and divorce patterns.

- **Srinivas, M. N. (2002) – Social Change in Modern India:** M. N. Srinivas discussed concepts such as Westernization, Sanskritization, and modernization and their impact on Indian society. The study noted that urbanization has altered traditional values concerning marriage, caste, and family life.

This work provides a theoretical basis for understanding changing marital trends in urban Karnataka.

- **Desai and Andrist (2010):** Using demographic data from India, the researchers examined changing marriage patterns and observed increasing age at marriage, educational attainment, and women's participation in the workforce. These changes were found to influence marital decision-making and family dynamics.

The study explains how socio-economic changes contribute to changing marriage patterns and marital stability.

- **All India Survey on Higher Education and Urban Family Studies (2015–2020):** Several urban family studies in India reported that increased education, career aspirations, and economic independence among women have transformed gender relations within marriage. These changes have sometimes led to marital conflicts and increased divorce rates.



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Changing Marriage Trends in Urban Karnataka:

- **Increase in Age at Marriage:**Urban youth in cities like Bengaluru and Mysuru are postponing marriage due to:Higher education, Career aspirations, Financial stability concerns and Desire for personal independence. This delay reflects modernization and changing priorities.
- **Rise of Love Marriages and Inter-Caste Marriages:**Traditionally, arranged marriages dominated Karnataka society. However, urban areas show: Growing acceptance of love marriages, Increased inter-caste and inter-religious marriages and Greater autonomy in partner selection.’ Urban education and workplace interactions facilitate such relationships.
- **Decline of Joint Family System:**Urbanization promotes nuclear family arrangements. Couples prefer independent living due to:Employment mobility, Privacy concerns, Urban housing constraints. The absence of extended family support sometimes increases marital stress.
- **Emergence of Online Matrimonial Platforms:**Digital platforms and social media have transformed partner selection processes. Urban youth increasingly use matrimonial websites and dating apps.

Divorce Trends in Urban Karnataka:

- **Increasing Divorce Petitions:** Family courts in Bengaluru and other urban centers report a steady rise in divorce cases over the past two decades. Although Karnataka’s divorce rate remains lower compared to Western countries, the upward trend in urban areas is significant.
- **Major Causes of Divorce:**
 - **Incompatibility and Communication Gaps:**Urban couples often struggle with balancing professional and personal life.
 - **Economic Independence of Women:** Women’s employment enhances autonomy but may challenge traditional gender expectations.
 - **Domestic Violence and Harassment:** Legal awareness encourages women to exit abusive marriages.
 - **Work Stress and Urban Lifestyle:**Long working hours in IT and corporate sectors contribute to emotional distance.
 - **Interference from Extended Family:**Despite nuclearization, family interference continues to influence marital disputes.
- **Socio-Economic Factors Influencing Marriage and Divorce:**
 - **Education:** Higher education promotes:Individual choice in marriage, Awareness of rights, Lower tolerance for abusive relationships, Educated couples may also have higher expectations from marriage.
 - **Employment and Dual-Income Families:**Dual-income households increase financial stability but create:Role conflicts, Time constraints, Childcare challenges, Gender negotiation becomes central to marital harmony.
 - **Urban Housing and Cost of Living:**High cost of living in Bengaluru creates financial pressures, leading to conflicts.



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➤ **Gender Dimensions:**

- **Changing Role of Women:** Urban women increasingly pursue: Higher education, Professional careers, Financial independence. This transformation shifts power dynamics within marriage.
- **Men and Changing Masculinity:** Urban men face pressure to adapt to egalitarian relationships. Failure to adjust may result in marital strain.
- **Impact on Children:** Children of divorced parents may experience: Emotional distress, Custody disputes, Adjustment difficulties, However, in some cases, separation reduces exposure to conflict.

➤ **Cultural Transformation and Individualism:** Urban Karnataka reflects growing individualism: Emphasis on personal happiness, Acceptance of remarriage, Social tolerance towards divorce. Though stigma still exists, particularly among older generations.

➤ **Legal and Institutional Context:** Marriage and divorce in Karnataka are governed by various personal laws such as: Hindu Marriage Act, 1955, Special Marriage Act, 1954, Muslim Personal Law. Family courts in urban centers handle rising cases, indicating greater legal awareness.

- **Transformation of Marriage as an Institution:** Marriage is shifting from a sacramental bond to a contractual partnership emphasizing companionship and equality.
- **Social Mobility and Autonomy:** Women’s empowerment and economic independence contribute to greater autonomy.

- **Emotional and Mental Health Concerns:** Urban marital stress contributes to anxiety, depression, and counselling demand.
- **Comparative Perspective:** Compared to rural Karnataka: Urban areas have higher divorce rates. Greater acceptance of love marriages. Increased nuclear households. Rural regions still uphold stronger traditional norms.
