## ELDER Dr Sam Ye Han

If I have to summarize my personal thoughts on the year 2020 into one word, it would be 'fear'. From the God's Story sermon series, I've learned what it looks to have an appropriate reverent fear of God through the Old Testament. His grace is shown to undeserved sinners along with His just punishment against rebellious sinners.

Christians have always needed to fear God, in all times, across all circumstances. The series has compelled me to live with this right, worshipful fear instead of being intimidated by other circumstances such as the COVID-19 pandemic. Do we fear God such that we won't let anything be an obstacle to worship Him? Do we fear Him enough to ensure nothing stops us from gathering with the rest of the church gathering eg. on Sundays? Do we fear Him such that we will be motivated to witness for Him to those who need to recognize true hope? I've had to struggle with these important questions as I serve faithfully.

My hope and prayer for 2021 is for a few things to take place. Firstly, I hope for us to return to physical gatherings in time for our 13th Foundation Day. Secondly, I'd want to welcome the current batch of member candidates as church members. Thirdly, I look forward to the return of <u>Geddit</u>, our signature evangelistic event. (The last Geddit skit we had was back in March 2020 right before we went into lockdown.)

Just like the Reformers did, may the church continue to uphold the banner of gospel truth as we move into 2021 by making the most of our <u>Growth Group</u> sessions, putting in effort to plan for evangelism and discipleship initiatives, and making sure our church building is always in tip-top condition to host everyone back. 2020 has been a year of solitude, but not a year without opportunities.

Therefore, I hope that 2021 will be an even better year for us as CERC makes the most of the opportunities God gives us to grow and advance His kingdom in the Klang Valley.


**BAPTISM**
